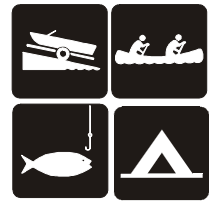


Ojibway/Triangle



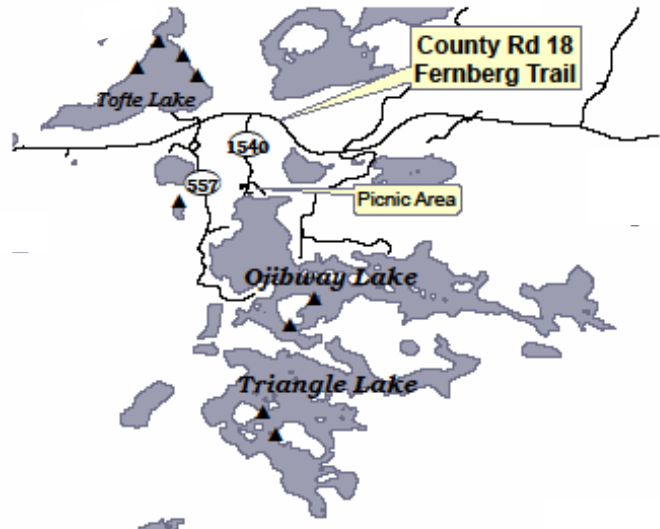

Features

- 4 island campsites, 2 on each lake, with fire grates, tent pads and latrines
- Permit required to access BWCAW entry point #29, North Kawishiwi River
- No camping fee
- Roller portage to Triangle Lake
- Lake trout, walleye and bass fishing
- Picnic area
- Back down ramp
- Motorized lakes



“Caution: Lakes contain numerous rock reefs.”

Be considerate of others: Large or heavily laden boats may make the roller portage unusable for others. Light weight boats with motors and canoes may be moved across the rollers.

Location

- Ojibway and Triangle Lakes are 14 miles northeast of Ely.
- From Ely, take State Highway # 169 (Fernberg Road-#18) east for 14 miles to Forest Road 1540.
- Turn right on Forest Road 1540 and travel 1/2 mile to the Ojibway Lake access.
- Triangle Lake is located across the lake and directly south of Ojibway Lake.



Leave No Trace Principles

2. Travel and camp on durable surfaces.
3. Dispose of waste properly.
4. Minimize use and impact of fires.
5. Respect wildlife.
6. Leave what you find.

Superior National Forest - Ojibway/Triangle

DESCRIPTION

The Kawishiwi Ranger District provides developed back country campsites outside of campground settings, yet without the constraints imposed by wilderness restrictions.

The crystal clear waters of Ojibway Lake add to the scenic beauty of this area. The lake is 343 acres in size with a maximum depth of 117 feet, and includes two island campsites. A small picnic area and a back down ramp are located at the landing. Use caution when departing and approaching the ramp as there is a rock reef in the area. Stay to the west to avoid the reef. Fishing opportunities include lake trout, walleye, bass, and northern pike.

There is a short roller portage between Ojibway and Triangle Lakes. Small boats with motors and canoes can be pulled across rollers to get to the more remote Triangle Lake. Triangle is almost 400 acres, has a maximum depth of 40 feet and also includes two island campsites. Fishing opportunities include wall-eye, bass, and northern pike. A 190 rod portage leading to BWCAW Entry Point #29-North Kawishiwi River can be found at the southern most part of the lake. A permit is required to enter the BWCAW.

Jewell Lake is an 11 acre lake and can be accessed by a portage trail from Ojibway Lake or by parking in a small lot along Forest Road #557, the Ojibway Summer Home road, and walking to the lake.
