Legal Description: Bald Rock Conservation Center, Tract 4217, is described as being all that tract of land with improvements, located at 124 London Dock Road (Kentucky State Highway 1193), London, Kentucky, 40744, containing 10.74 acres, more or less, and being a part or portion of two larger or parent tracts, USA Tract C-245b and USA Tract C-1520. The subject tract is located southeast of the intersection of Kentucky State Highways 192 and 1193, near Laurel River Lake, Sheltowee Trace National Recreation Trail, and Cane Creek Wildlife Management Area. The site is situated approximately 14 air miles southwest of London, the county seat for Laurel County, Kentucky and is identified as being a part of federal land identified as Map 023-00-00-015.00 in the Laurel County tax records. The property fronts on Kentucky State Highway 1193 for approximately 1,091± feet. A gated gravel surfaced road provides good access to the site from Kentucky State Highway 1193 and utility water is supplied to the site from West Laurel Water Association. (See attached Legal Description and Survey Plat for more detail)

Currently, the Bald Rock Conservation Center is unoccupied, however past use by the Forest Service includes uses as a research facility in the late 1950's and early 1960's, and for training and educational purposes and also as a fire facility, since that time. Previous to the Forest Service occupation, the site served as a Civilian Conservation Corps facility, Camp F15, Company 3552, established in 1938.

Eleven buildings or structures containing a total of approximately 9,039 square feet are located within the boundary identified for disposal. The structures include, four crew quarter buildings, a "sheet shack" (historical structure that contained linens for crew use), a mess hall, utility building (rec. bldg.), a men's and women's shower buildings, a classroom, and a shed (shooting range). The site also has a shooting range, a volleyball court, radio tower, natural and gravel surfaced roads, walkways, wastewater mounds, water hydrant, housing for valves, vents and inspection portals. All structures and improvements are approved for disposal.

Crew Quarters: Buildings 1, 2 and 3 have one large room and storage. Building 4 has two rooms and storage.

Sheet Shack: This building is a historical structure that contained linens for crew use. The structure consists of one room with storage. (*Constructed 1935 moved to current site 1955*)

Mess Hall: Large dining area with rock fireplace, 2½ baths, kitchen, cooler, and storage. (*Constructed 1959 converted to mess hall in 1978, addition in 1990s*)

Utility Building: 1 room with storage, used as a recreation facility. (*Moved to current site 1980*)

Men and Women's Bath Houses: Toilets, showers, and sinks. (*Constructed in Florida, moved to Texas, then moved to current location in 1990*)

Classroom: 1 room with small storage area.

Shed (Shooting Range): Open shed with enclosed storage area.

Other site improvements: Shooting range, volleyball court, radio tower, natural and gravel surfaced roads, walkways, wastewater mounds, water hydrant, housing for valves, vents and inspection portals.

The "Sheet Shack" a structure that contained linens for crew use, was determined to be eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. The Sheet Shack was initially constructed in 1935 at the Bald Rock Fire Tower site where it served as the lookout's crew quarters. The Sheet Shack was moved to its current location at Bald Rock Conservation Center in 1955. The Daniel Boone National Forest compiled and submitted a report to the State Historic Preservation Office, as mitigation against the adverse effect of the property's transfer from public to private holding which resulted in the "Sheet Shack" being cleared for disposal. The submission was in conformance with their Standard Mitigation Measures for Historic Structures being demolished and fulfills mitigation requirements developed in consultation with the State Historic Preservation Office of Tourism, Arts and Heritage Cabinet, Kentucky Heritage Council. The Sheet Shack can be sold with the Bald Rock Conservation Center property.

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The Kentucky Division of Waste Management, Superfund Branch, reviewed the Corrective Action summary report submitted on the Shooting Range by Daniel Boone National Forest and Sharp engineering, Inc. on August 21 2006, and the confirmation of removal and disposal of spent cartridges and ammunition dated January 25, 2007. The reports summarized the soil testing activities and removal of potential sources of contamination conducted at the referenced site by Sharp Engineering, Inc. The Kentucky Division of Waste Management, Superfund Branch, determined that the remediation succeeded in bringing the site into compliance with Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) 224.01-400 (18) ©. Therefore, no further action is necessary regarding the above-referenced release, as stated in a letter to Mike Jacobson from Environmental and Public Protection Cabinet dated February 12, 2007.

A well of unknown depth, purpose or origin is located on the property. The Forest recently filled the well with gravel, sealed and capped it. Additionally, a riser pipe located next to the “sheet shack” indicated a possible UST, and was investigated by the Forest. Soil mixed with abundant pieces of broken brick and mortar was located beneath the riser pipe, and it was concluded that this was a waste area that had been covered with soil and re-vegetated and that no UST exists at this site.

Acres: containing 10.74 acres, more or less, with improvements

Status: Acquired – Tract C-1520 was acquired by Deed dated October 14, 1935 from The Castle Craig Coal Company to the USA and recorded October 23, 1935 in Deed Book 79, Pages 379-430 in Laurel County, Kentucky. Tract C-1520 was acquired under the provisions of the Weeks Law Act of March 1, 1911, (36 Stat. 961).

Tract C-245b was acquired by the USA from Binder Brothers Lumber Company by Warranty deed dated April 4, 1972 and recorded on April 13, 1972 in deed book 212 in page 167 – 240 in the Laurel County, Kentucky and on April 7, 1972 in deed book 324, pages 218 – 291 in Pulaski County, Kentucky. Tract C-245b was acquired under the provisions of the Weeks Law Act of March 1, 1911, (36 Stat. 961), the Land and Water Conservation Fund Act of 1965 (78 Stat. 897), and the Department of the Interior and Related Agencies Appropriation Act, of 1971 (84 Stat. 669).

Encumbrances and Outstanding Rights: The Bald Rock Conservation Center is situated on portions of two USA tracts, Tract C-1520 and Tract C-245b. This site is subject to easements for existing roads, highways and public utilities. Minerals, coal, oil and gas are reserved from Tract C-245b as recorded in DB 212, page 167 - 240 and Tract C-1520 is subject to minerals, oil and gas as recorded in DB 79, pages 379 – 430. Tract C-1520 is also subject to an easement or right of way for a pipeline, telephone and telegraph lines as described in Misc. Book 1, page 235 of the Laurel Co. Clerk's office. Tract C-245b is subject to KY Hwy 192 as recorded 1/4/1957 in Deed Book 136, Page 499 in Laurel County Records. This site may also subject to an easement to West Laurel Water Association for lines located along KY Hwy 192 and Kentucky Route #1193, however, according to drawings found at the London Ranger District Office, it appears the lines are located across the highway, opposite the Bald Rock Conservation Center. The site is subject to 150' easement for Kentucky Utilities Company Transmission Power Line which is located along the northern boundary of the subject and recorded in a deed dated 11/6/1961 of record in Deed Book 154, Page 26 in the Laurel County Records.

The USDA Forest Service acting on behalf and for the United States of America shall reserve to United States of America (Grantor) and its assigns, a non-exclusive right-of-way easement for Kentucky State Highway 1193, being a strip of land 30 feet wide on the right or west side of the existing centerline of Kentucky State Highway 1193, as described in the legal description and as shown on the survey plat for Bald Rock Conservation Center, Tract 4217.

Bald Rock Conservation Center fronts on a portion of Kentucky State Highway 1193 within USA Tract C-1520 for approximately 1,091± feet. A Special Use Permit, dated July 31, 1957 was issued to Kentucky Department of Highways for Forest Development Road 63 and Kentucky State Highway 1193, both of which cross USA Tract C-1520. The USDA Forest Service proposes to convey title to Bald Rock Conservation Center to the successful bidder in fee, including that portion of Kentucky State Highway 1193

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which fronts the Bald Rock Conservation Center and extends to the centerline of the road. The Forest Service, in an effort to protect the current status of Kentucky State Highway 1193, will reserve an easement from the fee conveyance on behalf of the United States and its assigns, on that portion of Kentucky State Highway 1193 that is currently being administered by the above referenced special use. The Forest Service will continue to administer this section of highway as a special use to the Kentucky Department of Highways and the current permit will remain valid with no change or impact to the management of Kentucky State Highway 1193.

All that certain tract or parcel of land lying and being in Laurel County, Kentucky, situated approximately fourteen and one half miles southwest of London, Kentucky, on the divide ridge between the waters of Ben Branch of Sam Branch of Craig Creek, a tributary of Laurel River and No Business Branch, a tributary of Rockcastle River. The tract is more particularly described as follows:

All bearings in this description are referred to Grid based on NAD 1927, KY South Zone except those for bearing trees, which are referred to 2007 magnetic. All distances are expressed in feet.

BEGINNING AT CORNER 1, which is a point, determined by calculation, located centerline of KY highway 1193 and in line between corners 166 and 167 of USA Tract 1520. Unable to monument the true corner location, reference the point with corner 166 of USA Tract 1520, same being a 1 $\frac{3}{4}$ " X 30" aluminum pipe with 3" aluminum cap set in a mound of red painted rocks and stamped 166, TR.1520, 714, 1986 which bears N71°17'10"E 29.42 feet. Corner is common to USA Tract 1520 and The Commonwealth of Kentucky, Db. 140, Pg. 538.

Thence, one (1) line in part with The Commonwealth of Kentucky and Viola Hale;

(1) **South 71°17'09" West 42.25** feet to **CORNER 2**, which is the same as corner 167 of USA Tract 1520, a 1 $\frac{3}{4}$ " X 30" aluminum pipe with 3" aluminum cap set in a mound of red painted rocks and stamped 167, TR.1520, 714, 1986 and 2, 4217. Corner is common to Viola Hale, Db. 164, Pg. 156 and Wb. 14, Pg. 26.

Thence, one (1) line with Viola Hale;

(1) **South 70°21'10" West 139.54** feet to **CORNER 3**, which is the same as corner 168 of USA Tract, a 1 $\frac{3}{4}$ " X 30" aluminum pipe with 3" aluminum cap set in a mound of red painted rocks and stamped 168, TR.1520, 714, 1986 and 3, 4217. Corner is common to Viola Hale, Db. 99, Pg. 528 and Db. 153, Pg. 257.

Thence, one (1) line in part with Hale and Sergent, which runs mostly along a wire fence;

(1) **North 26°30'42" West**, at 29.30 feet passing a steel pin with a yellow plastic cap stamped RSP, PLS 2776, located at a fence corner and common to Viola Hale, Db. 153, Pg. 257 and Richard and Lois Sergent, Db. 601, Pg. 210, in all **752.05** feet to **CORNER 4**, a 32" white oak with two sets of three red painted hacks, a standard concrete post with 3" brass cap stamped 2518 called for, we do not find. Same being corner 169 of USA Tract 1520 and 1 of USA Tract 245b. Corner is common to Richard and Lois Sergent, Db.601, Pg. 210.

Thence, one (1) line in part with Sergent and Mayes, which runs along a wire fence;

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(1) **North 78°34'59" West**, at 141.00 feet passing a steel pin with a yellow plastic cap stamped RSP, PLS 2776, common to Richard and Lois Sergent, Db.601, Pg. 210 and Betty Mays, Db. 601, Pg. 202, in all **311.05'** to **CORNER 5**, a point determined by calculation on line between corners 1 and 2 of USA Tract 245b, a 1¾" X 30" aluminum pipe with 3" aluminum cap set in a mound of red painted rocks and stamped 5, 4217, 245b, 3243, 2006 with a 54-2 sign post erected alongside. Corner witnessed with the following B.T.s (1) 16" white oak N 48 W 14.75', (2) 8" white oak N 10 W 38.15', (3) 14" white oak N 02 E 14.25'. We paint red bands and an erect 54-3 signs on all B.T.s 1 and 2. Corner is common to Betty Mayes, Db. 601, Pg. 202 and located 4.5 south of a woven wire fence.

Thence, one (1) line severing USA Tract 245b;

We cover each monument with a rock and erect a 54-2 sign post alongside. 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

The Kentucky Division of Waste Management, Superfund Branch, has reviewed the Corrective Action summary report submitted by Daniel Boone National Forest and Sharp Engineering, Inc. on August 21, 2006, and the confirmation of removal and disposal of spent cartridges and ammunition dated January 25, 2007. The reports summarize the soil testing activities and removal of potential sources of contamination conducted at the referenced site by Sharp Engineering, Inc.

Initial site assessment activities indicated that constituents of concern (RCRA Metals) were below US EPA Region 9 PRGs with the exception of Arsenic. For Arsenic contamination in soils, Kentucky uses an ambient background assessment defined in the January 8, 2004 document "Kentucky Guidance for Ambient Background Assessment." This document cites 401 KAR 42:005 as defining background and establishes the techniques to calculate background levels for various substances, including Arsenic. The Arsenic levels at this site fall below established background levels for the Commonwealth of Kentucky. Once soil was established to fall beneath action levels then all cartridges, casings, and projectiles from spent ammunition were collected at the site to prevent leaching of metals into the soil.

The Branch has determined that the remediation has succeeded in bringing the site into compliance with Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) 224.01-400 (18) (c). Therefore, no further action is necessary regarding the above-referenced release. The Division does reserve the right to request further action if additional affects from this release, or any other, are later reported. From this point forward, the Branch considers further maintenance and care of the work area to be your responsibility.
