- 500 feet of major trail reconstruction/ completion on an internal section of the Bonneville Shoreline Trail
- Invasive species removal

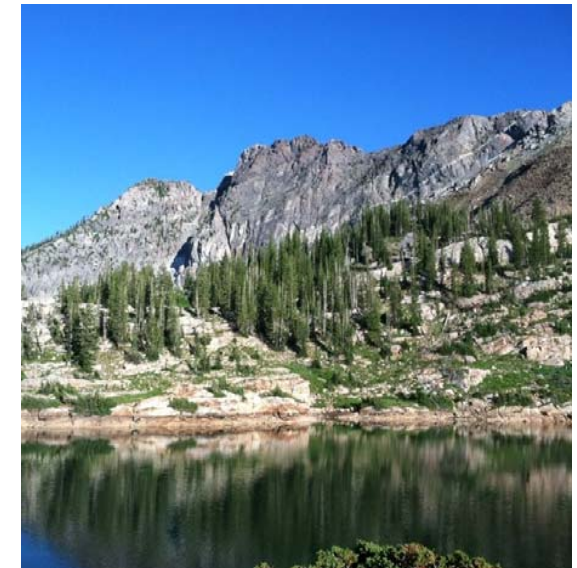

The Wasatch Legacy Project (WLP) is a public/private partnership made up of federal, state, county and municipal Governments, nongovernmental organizations, and ski resorts, with support from the outdoor retailer industry. Our partnership provides a unique opportunity to leverage individual resources to collectively accomplish our common goal of enhancing the stewardship of the city's watersheds for clean water and sustainable recreation.



Why is your watershed important?

We all live in a watershed. Watersheds are the places we call home; where we work and where we play. Everyone relies on water and other natural resources to exist. What you and others do on the land impacts the quality and quantity of water, and our other natural resources. Your activity in the canyons can have an immediate impact on the quality of your drinking water. It can take less than 24 hours for the water you see in the stream to reach the drinking water faucets in the valley.

Projects we have identified so far include invasive weed pulls, conservation education programs, trail rehabilitation, vegetation management, fuels reduction, water quality monitoring, climate change planning, and more!
