Malheur National Forest

February 1st, 2013

Visitors should prepare for all weather conditions, let someone know your plans, as well as the estimated time of return.

Firewood cutting and campfires are permitted. Firewood tags and permits are available at all Malheur National Forest Offices.

Partial Road Closure – Forest Road 15

John Day, OR – Due to continuing operations on the Parish Cabin Fire Salvage and to ensure public safety, the following temporary road closure will remain in effect until further notice:

- Forest Road 15 from the Forest Road 1520 junction south to the Forest Road 16 junction.


The temporary closure of Forest Road 16 has been lifted; access will be limited by winter weather conditions.

Sno-Park Information:

- Huddleston Sno-Park is open for the season. The road into the Sno-park is plowed as well as the parking area. Huddleston has many trails for snowshoeing and skiing and is a great place for snowmobilers to access numerous groomed and non-groomed trails. Huddleston also provides a nice warming hut to gather in after a day playing in the snow.
- Starr Sno-Park and Snow Bowl are open for the season. Starr Sno-Park has many groomed and un-groomed snowmobile trails that start at the park. Snowshoeing and skiing trails are a great way to enjoy the wonderful outdoors during the winter months. Close to the Sno-Park is the Snow Bowl, this is located just off of Hwy 395 South. The parking area for the Snow Bowl is the wide pull out on the highway in front of Starr Campground; the play area is on the opposite side of the highway. Please use caution when crossing the highway. The Snow Bowl has a great hill for snowboarding, sledding and skiing. There is a nice warming hut at the bottom of the hill perfect for taking the chill off in-between runs.
- Dixie Sno-Park is open for the season. The Dixie Sno-Park is located at the summit of Dixie Mountain on Hwy 26. The parking is on the side of the highway in the wide area. Please use caution if crossing the highway. There are many groomed and un-groomed trails for snowmobile travel in the area. Please use caution in areas and watch for snowmobile crossing signs.

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- Idlewild Sno-Park is open for the season. Idlewild Sno-Park is off of Hwy 395 South. The park is a great starting point for snowmobiling, snowshoeing, and skiing. There are many groomed and un-groomed snowmobile trails in the area.

All Sno-Parks require a Sno-Park pass.

Passes can be purchased at any DMV or;

Passes cost: \$3 per day, \$7 for 3 day (consecutive), or \$20.00 for an annual.

Visitors to these areas should be prepared for snow or ice covered roads. Wear layers, as well as tinted eye protection to prevent snow blindness. Be mindful of other snowmobilers, snowshoers, or skiers who may be in the area.

Trails:

- When hiking, skiing or snowshoeing on the forest during the winter months please be prepared for rapidly changing weather conditions. The Malheur National Forest does not physically close trails during the winter; however trails are not maintained, visitors should be prepared for downed trees, snow and debris on the trails.
