REQUEST FOR QUOTATIONS DUMP CLEANUP CONTRACT

The Forest Service will award as many items as possible depending upon funding. Award will be made to one contractor for each item. Contractors may quote on all items or only one item. However, contractors must provide a price for all units within an individual item for quote to be considered.

STATEMENT OF WORK

Scope

The contractor shall furnish all labor, materials, equipment, transportation, tools, supervision, supplies and incidentals except as listed under government furnished property; to perform all work required to remove, transport, and dispose of all material in trespass dump sites in accordance with the specifications, maps, terms, and conditions of this contract.

Project Location

The areas are located within the boundaries of the Mark Twain National Forest, Eleven Point Ranger District, in Oregon, Shannon, and Carter Counties, Missouri. Sites have been identified on maps and by description. Some units are trash clean up along entire roads and some units are individual dump sites. See area maps attached. Access to some sites may involve the removal and re-installation of road closures. Other sites may be in or near streams.

Description of Work

Removal and Cleanup means removing all debris leaving a workable soil level for seeding and mulching. Slope stability of each area may be required by filling, grading, and compacting, where necessary. Removal and clean up may involve the use of a tractor, skid-steer, dozer, backhoe, and/or dump truck. Special handling and disposal is required for all material that might contain toxic or hazardous substances. The Contractor will be prepared to provide this special handling and disposal, as required by environmental regulation or law. Possible items might include but not be limited to, refrigeration equipment with Freon, tire carcasses, auto batteries, florescent light bulbs and ballasts, used oil, vehicle fuel tanks, electronic components, and any other item containing known toxic or hazardous substances. All of these items must either be recycled or disposed at a facility licensed to properly dispose of the type of hazardous material. The Contractor is responsible for maintaining the integrity and stability of highways, roads, and road embankments affected by work under this contract. Any measures needed to stabilize road embankments, reconstruct drainage structures, or repaving of highway surfaces affected by this work shall be the responsibility of the Contractor. The Contractor must obey state weight limits. All trucks used to transport debris from any site must be covered by tarp or other means necessary to prevent material from blowing out of the truck during transport.

REQUEST FOR QUOTATIONS DUMP CLEANUP CONTRACT

Landscape Preservation

The contractor shall give attention to the effect of contract operation upon the landscape and shall conduct the work at all times in compliance with the following requirements:

Minimize damage to the Landscape.

The Contractor shall minimize ground disturbance and damage to trees, shrubs, or other natural feature or any other improvements in the work area to the extent possible in the removal and cleanup of these sites. However, this does not relieve the Contractor of any obligation to remove and dispose of all waste within the site. Waste shall not in any case be covered or otherwise allowed to remain in place.

Protect Streams, Lakes and Reservoirs.

The Contractor shall take sufficient precautions to prevent pollution of streams, lakes, small ponds, and reservoirs with fuels, oils, bitumen, calcium chloride, silt, or other harmful materials. Mechanical equipment shall not be operated in live streams without the approval of the COR or Inspector.

Protect Plants, Animals, Cultural Resources, and Cave Resources.

Areas, known by the Government, needing special measures for the protection of plants, animals, cultural resources, and/or cave resources will be identified prior to starting work. Contractor shall conduct operations in a manner that does not damage or disturb identified areas. In the event that protective measures identified by the Government are inadequate, Contracting Officer may delay or interrupt Contractor's operations, and/or modify the contract. Discovery, by either the Contractor or the Government, of additional areas, resources, or species needing special protection shall be promptly reported to the other party.

The Contractor shall install, operate, and maintain erosion control devices, such as silt fences or straw bales as specified by the COR or any other permit required by this work.

The Contractor shall minimize the cutting of trees and excavation to the extent possible. Disturbed areas shall be re-vegetated.

The Contractor shall be responsible for establishing acceptable erosion prevention vegetation on areas of ground disturbance in the contract area. This requirement only applies to the areas identified by the Forest Service, which are a result of the Contractors actions. Re-vegetation measures shall be applied in such a manner and at times as directed by the Forest Service to establish an acceptable grass or legume cover.

The Contractor shall use the following rates in re-vegetating disturbed areas: One or more of the following must be applied at a rate of 30 pounds per acre: winter wheat, oats, or an annual rye with an additional 5 pounds per acre of clover. A standard fertilizer (12-12-12) or better shall be applied at a rate of 300 pounds per acre. The Contractor shall not begin re-vegetation work unless approved by the COR or Inspector.

REQUEST FOR QUOTATIONS DUMP CLEANUP CONTRACT

Safety

The Contractor is responsible for safety and shall be in compliance with all applicable State and Federal safety requirements or regulations at all times for workers and the general public. The Contractor shall maintain safe traffic access along highways and roads and shall comply with all regulations of Missouri Department of Transportation. On-site hazards: Standing snags and downed trees; operating heavy equipment with insufficient training or experience; performing earthwork or excavation activities upslope of a roadway or other facility or activity; refueling equipment; performing maintenance on equipment; unearthing buried hazards such as meth lab dump sites; other vehicle traffic; and adverse weather conditions. These are not all inclusive.

Inspection

At the completion of each site, the Contractor shall provide the COR with the following documentation:

- Digital Photographs before, during, and after the cleanup
- Names of all facilities used for disposal of waste, tires and other recyclables, and hazardous materials
- Weigh tickets for all waste, tires and other recyclables, and hazardous materials disposed.

Inspection of the work shall be made by the Contracting Officer's Representative (COR) or the designated inspector as the work progresses at such intervals as are necessary to ensure compliance with the contract specifications and provisions. Upon completion of a site, the contractor shall notify the COR so that they can make an inspection of that phase of work. If the work is unacceptable, the contractor shall complete any remedial work required for acceptance prior to commencing work on the next area.

Unit Descriptions:

This project consists of twenty units spread across the Eleven Point Ranger District.


Unit G1 has special considerations that must be followed by the Contractor for the protection of resources. All debris may or may not be removed.

Units D2 to D8 are individual dump sites that all debris will be removed.

Units R9 to R20 are Forest Service roads, non-system trails, and County roads that have varying amounts of debris scattered along either sides of the road. All debris on both sides of the road identified must be removed within 100 feet of centerline on both sides of the linear feature.

It is the responsibility of the bidder to examine the specific units. Each unit may have different conditions (amount, items, terrain, access, etc). The bidder can't assume a new project will be similar to a previous project.







D2 and D3**







D5, D6, D7, and D8





R9,R10, and R11**





R12 and R13**





R15, R16, and R17**





HEALTH & WELFARE: \$3.71 per hour or \$148.40 per week or \$643.07 per month

VACATION: 2 weeks paid vacation after 1 year of service with a contractor or successor; 3 weeks after 8 years, and 4 weeks after 15 years. Length of service includes the whole span of continuous service with the present contractor or successor, wherever employed, and with the predecessor contractors in the performance of similar work at the same Federal facility. (Reg. 29 CFR 4.173)

HOLIDAYS: A minimum of ten paid holidays per year, New Year's Day, Martin Luther King Jr's Birthday, Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Columbus Day, Veterans' Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day. (A contractor may substitute for any of the named holidays another day off with pay in accordance with a plan communicated to the employees involved.) (See 29 CFR 4174)

THE OCCUPATIONS WHICH HAVE NUMBERED FOOTNOTES IN PARENTHESES RECEIVE THE FOLLOWING:

- 1) Does not apply to employees employed in a bona fide executive, administrative, or professional capacity as defined and delineated in 29 CFR 541. (See CFR 4.156)
- 2) AIR TRAFFIC CONTROLLERS AND WEATHER OBSERVERS - NIGHT PAY & SUNDAY PAY: If you work at night as part of a regular tour of duty, you will earn a night differential and receive an additional 10% of basic pay for any hours worked between 6pm and 6am. If you are a full-time employed (40 hours a week) and Sunday is part of your regularly scheduled workweek, you are paid at your rate of basic pay plus a Sunday premium of 25% of your basic rate for each hour of Sunday work which is not overtime (i.e. occasional work on Sunday outside the normal tour of duty is considered overtime work).

HAZARDOUS PAY DIFFERENTIAL: An 8 percent differential is applicable to employees employed in a position that represents a high degree of hazard when working with or in close proximity to ordnance, explosives, and incendiary materials. This includes work such as screening, blending, dying, mixing, and pressing of sensitive ordnance, explosives, and pyrotechnic compositions such as lead azide, black powder and photoflash powder. All dry-house activities involving propellants or explosives.

Demilitarization, modification, renovation, demolition, and maintenance operations on sensitive ordnance, explosives and incendiary materials. All operations involving regrading and cleaning of artillery ranges.

A 4 percent differential is applicable to employees employed in a position that represents a low degree of hazard when working with, or in close proximity to ordnance, (or employees possibly adjacent to) explosives and incendiary materials which involves potential injury such as laceration of hands, face, or arms of the employee engaged in the operation, irritation of the skin, minor burns and the like; minimal damage to immediate or adjacent work area or equipment being used. All operations involving, unloading, storage, and hauling of ordnance, explosive, and incendiary ordnance material other than small arms ammunition. These differentials are only applicable to work that has been specifically designated by the agency for ordnance, explosives, and incendiary material differential pay.

** UNIFORM ALLOWANCE **

If employees are required to wear uniforms in the performance of this contract (either by the terms of the Government contract, by the employer, by the state or local law, etc.), the cost of furnishing such uniforms and maintaining (by laundering or dry cleaning) such uniforms is an expense that may not be borne by an employee where such cost reduces the hourly rate below that required by the wage determination. The Department of Labor will accept payment in accordance with the following standards as compliance:

The contractor or subcontractor is required to furnish all employees with an adequate number of uniforms without cost or to reimburse employees for the actual cost of the uniforms. In addition, where uniform cleaning and maintenance is made the responsibility of the employee, all contractors and subcontractors subject to this wage determination shall (in the absence of a bona fide collective bargaining agreement providing for a different amount, or the furnishing of contrary affirmative proof as to the actual cost), reimburse all employees for such cleaning and maintenance at a rate of \$3.35 per week (or \$.67 cents per day). However, in those instances where the uniforms furnished are made of "wash and wear" materials, may be routinely washed and dried with other personal garments, and do not require any special treatment such as dry cleaning, daily washing, or commercial laundering in order to meet the cleanliness or appearance standards set by the terms of the Government contract, by the contractor, by law, or by the nature of the work, there is no requirement that employees be reimbursed for uniform maintenance costs.

The duties of employees under job titles listed are those described in the "Service Contract Act Directory of Occupations", Fifth Edition, April 2006, unless otherwise indicated. Copies of the Directory are available on the Internet. REQUEST FOR AUTHORIZATION OF ADDITIONAL CLASSIFICATION AND WAGE RATE {Standard Form 1444 (SF 1444)}

Conformance Process:

The contracting officer shall require that any class of service employee which is

not listed herein and which is to be employed under the contract (i.e., the work to be performed is not performed by any classification listed in the wage determination), be classified by the contractor so as to provide a reasonable relationship (i.e., appropriate level of skill comparison) between such unlisted classifications and the classifications listed in the wage determination. Such conformed classes of employees shall be paid the monetary wages and furnished the fringe benefits as are determined. Such conforming process shall be initiated by the contractor prior to the performance of contract work by such unlisted class(es) of employees. The conformed classification, wage rate, and/or fringe benefits shall be retroactive to the commencement date of the contract. {See Section 4.6 (C) (vi)} When multiple wage determinations are included in a contract, a separate SF 1444 should be prepared for each wage determination to which a class(es) is to be conformed.

The process for preparing a conformance request is as follows:

- 1) When preparing the bid, the contractor identifies the need for a conformed occupation(s) and computes a proposed rate(s).
- 2) After contract award, the contractor prepares a written report listing in order proposed classification title(s), a Federal grade equivalency (FGE) for each proposed classification(s), job description(s), and rationale for proposed wage rate(s), including information regarding the agreement or disagreement of the authorized representative of the employees involved, or where there is no authorized representative, the employees themselves. This report should be submitted to the contracting officer no later than 30 days after such unlisted class(es) of employees performs any contract work.
- 3) The contracting officer reviews the proposed action and promptly submits a report of the action, together with the agency's recommendations and pertinent information including the position of the contractor and the employees, to the Wage and Hour Division, Employment Standards Administration, U.S. Department of Labor, for review. (See section 4.6(b)(2) of Regulations 29 CFR Part 4).
- 4) Within 30 days of receipt, the Wage and Hour Division approves, modifies, or disapproves the action via transmittal to the agency contracting officer, or notifies the contracting officer that additional time will be required to process the request.
- 5) The contracting officer transmits the Wage and Hour decision to the contractor.
- 6) The contractor informs the affected employees.

Information required by the Regulations must be submitted on SF 1444 or bond paper.

When preparing a conformance request, the "Service Contract Act Directory of Occupations" (the Directory) should be used to compare job definitions to insure that duties requested are not performed by a classification already listed in the wage determination. Remember, it is not the job title, but the required tasks that determine whether a class is included in an established wage determination. Conformances may not be used to artificially split, combine, or subdivide classifications listed in the wage determination.
