Southwest Idaho and Eastern Oregon Cooperators 2013 Annual Operating Plan Between

Boise National Forest, Payette National Forest, Boise District Bureau of Land Management, Vale District Bureau of Land Management, Coeur d'Alene District, Cottonwood Field Office-Bureau of Land Management, Payette Lakes Supervisory Area-Idaho Department of Lands, Southwest Supervisory Area-Idaho Department of Lands and Southern Idaho Timber Protective Association.

I. Authority and Identification of Agencies

Cooperative Fire Protective Agreement, #07-FI-11015600-087 between the United States Department of Interior, Bureau of Land Management, National Park Service, Pacific Northwest Region, Bureau of Indian Affairs, Portland Area, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Pacific Region, the United States Department of Agriculture, Forest Service, Pacific Northwest, Intermountain and Northwest Regions, and the State of Idaho Department of Lands, signed July/August 2007.

And

Interagency agreement for fire management between the Bureau of Land Management, Bureau of Indian Affairs, National Park Service, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service of the Department of the Interior #1422RA 103-001 and the Forest Service of the United States Department of Agriculture. #02-IA-11132543-211.

II. Purpose of the Plan

The purpose of this operating plan is to provide a basis for cooperative wildland fire management activities on adjoining agency lands in Southwest Idaho and Eastern Oregon.

III. Protection Areas

A. Maps

The Idaho Department of Lands (IDL) will maintain the master map in GIS and make updates as needed for Idaho cooperators. Updates to the map should be provided to IDL by January 15th of every year. Vale BLM GIS map information will be provided upon request.

IV. Operating Procedures

A. Dispatch Centers

The following are initial attack agencies and supporting entities maintained by the Dispatch Centers.

Idaho

Boise Dispatch Center

- Boise National Forest, FS
- Deer Flat National Wildlife Refuge, FWS
- Great Basin Cache, Personnel
- Idaho State Office, BLM
- Boise District, BLM

Payette Dispatch Center

- Payette National Forest
- Southern Idaho Timber Protection Association (extended attack)
- Payette Lakes Supervisory Area, Idaho Dept. of Lands (extended attack)

SITPA

- Southern Idaho Timber Protection Association (initial attack)
- Payette Lakes Supervisory Area, Idaho Dept. of Lands (initial attack)

Oregon

Vale Dispatch Center

- Vale District, BLM

1. Prior to April 1 of each year, the parties to this plan will exchange their agency directories via the Southwest Idaho Cooperator's mailing list (See Appendix A).
2. Each member to this operating plan may exchange agency initial attack resources. These resources may be used on their local units only. If use is required beyond initial attack, the resources involved will be formally ordered using a resource order through the appropriate dispatch center.

3. All Southern Idaho Timber Protective Association (SITPA) orders for federal resources will go to Payette Dispatch. Orders from Boise Dispatch for SITPA resources will also go through Payette Dispatch.
4. Once aviation resources have been dispatched to SITPA, in flight requests may be made directly to the aircraft for staffing additional fires or changing targets. The flight crew leader will coordinate the request with the appropriate dispatch office who will confirm location and protecting agency for incident updating and reporting. Correct FireCodes ("P" numbers) will be assigned as soon as practical.
5. Boise Dispatch, Payette Dispatch and SITPA agree to notify each other whenever flights are being flown in mutual interest areas. Both SITPA and Boise Dispatch will notify Payette Dispatch of flights, which Payette Dispatch will forward to the third party.

B. Billings and Reimbursement

1. Payette Dispatch will assign a FireCode ("P" number) for all SITPA fires using federal resources.
2. Reimbursement for Forest Service fires to IDL
 - After the fire season is over each year, IDL/SITPA will send a list of reimbursable fires to Idaho Department of Lands in Coeur d'Alene.
 - Coeur d'Alene will submit that list of billing fires to Albuquerque Service Center (ASC), who will then forward to either Boise or Payette Dispatch for verification.
 - Dispatch will submit to the Forest Incident Business contact or Budget Officer who will then forward to ASC for payment.
3. Reimbursement for IDL fires to the Forest Service
 - ASC will pull reimbursable fires by the Host Unit ID's (ID-SIS and ID-SWS) from the Firecode System and submit that list of fires to the Idaho Department of Lands for payment.
4. Project Financial Plan (see Appendix B)

C. WFSA or WFDSS Policy and Procedures

1. Appropriate agency documentation will be completed for every fire.
 - Protecting agencies will involve the appropriate agency administrator from the jurisdictional agency in the preparation of all decision documents
 - IDL will complete a Wildland Fire Situation Analysis (WFSA) as needed.
 - FS/BLM will complete a Wildland Fire Decision Support System (WFDSS) for all fires with federal jurisdiction, regardless of protection.
 - For extended attack fires a WFDSS will be jointly prepared and signed by both protecting and jurisdictional agencies.

D. Delegation of Authority

1. Delegation of Authority and the Leaders Intent statement to the Incident Commander will be jointly prepared and signed by both protecting and jurisdictional agencies.

E. Special Management Considerations

1. Mutual Aid and Agreements
 - All parties from Southwest Idaho within this Cooperative Agreement may initiate Mutual Aid agreements with Rural Fire Departments located in the Southwest Idaho Cooperators jurisdictional area.
 - See Appendix C for a list of the mutual aid agreements within the Southwest Idaho and Eastern Oregon Cooperative area.

F. Prescribed Fire Cooperation

1. When a cooperator is doing prescribed burning within the protection boundary of another cooperator, the following steps should be taken:
 - Notify protecting dispatch office prior to starting the project. The following information is required at time of notification; project leader, location of project, size of project, radio frequency to contact project leader, anticipated resources assigned to project, staffing needs of dispatch, and duration of project.
 - Daily check in and update until project is completed.

2. Reimbursement for Prescribed Fire

- Planned Projects – In accordance with the master agreement, when parties to this plan do cooperative prescribed fire work, a Project Financial Plan (Appendix B) will be prepared for each project. The Plan will show what equipment and materials will be provided, what work each party will complete, the approximate cost, and how billing will be handled. These must be done 30 days in advance and an agreement number assigned by Grants and Agreements.
- Immediate Need – If resources are required for one of the cooperating agencies for immediate needs on a prescribed fire for holding, patrol or mop-up, a request will be placed through the appropriate dispatch center and documented on a resource order. The resource order will be recognized as a Task Order for the purpose of authorizing the billing. A Task Order is a document that explains the details for reimbursement on non-emergency projects and establishes the process of payment for work done. A Project Financial Plan will be completed as soon as reasonable after the use of the resources.

G. Severity

1. Fire severity requests will be coordinated with neighboring agencies when appropriate with current and predicted fire conditions.

V. Wildland Fire Suppression Procedures

A. Communications

1. The cooperating agencies agree to the utilization of the protecting agency frequencies. Incident Commander/Dispatch will communicate the tactical, air-to-ground, and command frequencies to responding resources. Agencies will share frequencies annually. (See Appendix D).

B. Boundary Fires

1. Reciprocal Fire Protection Zones between State of Idaho and the federal agencies are established as one mile either side of the common fire protection boundary. Follow the agreed upon billing procedures in the Statewide Operating Plan.

- Within these zones, a Supporting Agency will not bill the Protecting Agency for costs of initial dispatch until the cost of suppression action exceeds \$5,000
- In such cases where the costs exceed \$5,000, the entire cost of the fire will be billed
- All aviation resources ordered will be considered assistance by hire and therefore always billable. This can include flight time, daily availability and retardant, but not the personnel delivered to the fire.
- Suppression costs in excess of \$5,000 should be coordinated and agreed upon between agencies prior to final billing.
- All costs shall be billed for suppression resources outside of reciprocal fire protection zones

C. Fire Investigations

1. Initial attack (IA) resources shall determine probable fire cause, whether human or natural. If human cause is suspected, IA resources will determine the appropriate level of investigation and make every effort to protect the origin, regardless of jurisdictional responsibility. The protecting agency will request investigation through standard dispatch channels; the jurisdictional agency is responsible for fire investigation.

D. Fire Service Organizations (FSO)

1. The use of Fire Service Organization (FSO) resources shall follow these procedures:
 - If FSO resources are dispatched **outside** of their district/mutual response zone, they will be requested through IDL or SITPA.
 - It is the State's responsibility to be the single hiring point for equipment and personnel obtained from FSO's for all dispatches **outside** their jurisdictional responsibility.
 - When mobilized for extended attack, all equipment and personnel must be certified by the procedures established in the Idaho Fire Service Organization Rate Book.
 - **Only FSO apparatus listed on a current state Certificate of Local Government Fire Services Equipment may be hired.**
 - All FSO resources will be paid through Southwest Idaho Supervisory Area IDL or SITPA when using the IDL agreement.

- Fire service personnel and equipment must meet qualifications as outlined in the Idaho Fire Service Organization Rate Book, published annually by the Idaho Department of Lands.
2. Local Cooperative Fire Agreements for initial attack mutual assistance can be entered into with FSOs by any agency. For those FSOs that have entered into agreements with neighboring federal agencies for initial attack or other fire protection services, payment for initial attack responses will be processed through that agency. Rates will be in accord with the Idaho Fire Service Organization Rate Book.

E. Fire Reports

1. The protecting agency will report fire information for the Daily Situation Report and ICS 209 updates to the appropriate dispatch as required.
2. The fire report or a copy of the initial fire report will be sent to the jurisdictional dispatch center within 10 days of the incident being declared out. This should include a GPS location for all fires less than 10 acres and a GPS perimeter (as a shape file) for all fires greater than 10 acres. Please specify the format of the GPS data.

F. Fire Notifications

1. Per State Annual Operating Plan, each agency unit will promptly notify the appropriate protecting agency of fires burning on or threatening lands for which the agency has protection responsibilities. Likewise, protecting agencies will promptly inform jurisdictional agencies whenever they take action on fires for which the protecting agency is responsible.
2. The protecting agency will:
 - Notify and maintain coordination regarding all fire activity (including the use of aerial resources) in a timely manner.
 - Dispatch a fire investigator to all suspected human caused fires or request a fire investigator from the jurisdictional agency as needed.
 - Provide logistical support and serve as the primary ordering contact.
 - Assign fire numbers for suppression and fire report use and track all suppression costs.

- Assign an Incident Business Advisor (IBA) as determined by protecting agency.

G. Incident Management

1. Each agency will provide information concerning natural resource values and concerns. The jurisdictional agencies will provide the protecting agency with guidance related to specific resource values at risk.
 - The jurisdictional agencies will provide resource advisors as necessary per notification by protecting agency.
 - The protecting agency will follow Accidental Retardant Drop Reporting Guidelines (See Appendix E)
2. The protecting agency and the jurisdictional agency will coordinate when ordering an Incident Management Team.
3. The protecting agency and the jurisdictional agency will review, edit and provide joint signature of the IDL-WFSA or WFDSS as needed.

H. Suppression Rehab

1. Mitigation of suppression activity will be the responsibility of the protecting agency. Other burned area rehab will be the responsibility of the jurisdictional agency.

VI. Prevention

A. Restrictions and Closure Plan

1. Statewide, agencies will rotate the coordination of the Restrictions Plan on a bi-annual basis (BLM, FS & IDL). The Boise National Forest Public Information Officer (PIO) will take the lead in coordinating joint news releases of fire restriction orders for all agencies within Southwest Idaho as discussed within the Idaho Fire Restriction Plan. Vale shall follow fire restriction procedures as identified in the State of Oregon.
2. Refer to the Idaho Fire Restrictions Plan for more detailed information.

B. State of Idaho Burning Permits

1. Closed fire season is May 10th through October 20th each year. Each agency will report to the fire dispatch involved, the location of all burning permits issued that may be of concern to any other agency,

particularly those within one mile of lands protected by other agencies.

2. The issuance of Idaho burning permits will be overseen by a designated Deputy State Fire Warden.

C. Joint Activities - Prevention Outreach

1. The cooperating agencies will coordinate their fire prevention activities.
2. The cooperating agencies will strive for coordinated interagency fire prevention news releases.
3. The cooperating agencies will coordinate on releases to the media regarding fire danger ratings, fire potential, the number of fires and acres burned.

VII. Administration

A. Plan Review

1. Cooperating agencies will meet annually to review this operating plan. This meeting will be on the first Tuesday after February 15th, in Boise Idaho.
2. Plans will be developed and approved by May 1st of each year.
3. Scheduling and updating this plan will rotate between the Payette Forest and Boise Dispatch Centers.
 - a) Even years: Boise Dispatch Center
 - b) Odd years: Payette Dispatch Center

Appendix E-Accidental Retardant Drop Reporting Guidelines

For all retardant drops within 300 feet of streams or waterways the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) must be notified.

1. The incident will notify appropriate dispatch center immediately.
2. Dispatch will follow established SOP for notifications for internal management of the Jurisdictional Agency via Duty Officer.
3. Management will notify DEQ with appropriate information.
Contact DEQ: 911 or 800-632-8000(State Communications)
Be prepared to give the following information:
 - Location (lat/long)
 - Type of retardant (or other compound)
 - Amount released into a waterway
 - Time of release
 - One time release or ongoing (i.e. like a fuel tanker in the river that will gradually release fuel).
