Join a ranger from the Lewis & Clark Interpretive Center on the trail and explore the history and natural features of the landscape.


Gear up by bringing sunscreen, hat, large water bottle, insect repellent, snacks, binoculars, camera, and walking stick. No strollers, but children are welcome with an accompanying adult.

When: **June 29th** **July 13th** **August 10th**

Where: Meet at the Lewis & Clark Interpretive Center at **9:00am** and caravan/carpool or meet at **9:30am** at the Morony dam trailhead

Activity and Trail Length: 3 hours, 3.5 miles of moderate difficulty

Caution: Prickly pear, poison ivy, ticks and rattlesnakes may be present
Activity may cancel under threat of lightning or heavy rain
