Welcome To The White Mountain National Forest

Millions of people visit the White Mountain National Forest (WMNF) each year. Scenic drives and more than 1200 miles of trails offer a variety of experiences for people of all abilities and interests. Hiking, biking, camping, skiing, wildlife watching and snowmobiling are just a few of the activities enjoyed in our mountains and valleys. These "working forest" lands also produce timber, support wildlife habitat, and provide clean water for our New England communities.

Throughout 2014 the WMNF will celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Wilderness Act. Passed in 1964, this is the original legislation establishing the Wilderness Preservation System. Today there are 758 Wilderness Areas, spanning over 100 million acres. Wilderness is preserved for enduring values such as natural processes, solitude, and scientific research.

There are six congressionally designated Wilderness Areas in the WMNF, measuring over 150,000 acres. For more information about Wilderness and Wilderness 50th celebrations, visit www.wilderness50th.org.


