Wilderness: Comanche Peak

Peak Elevation: 11,400 feet

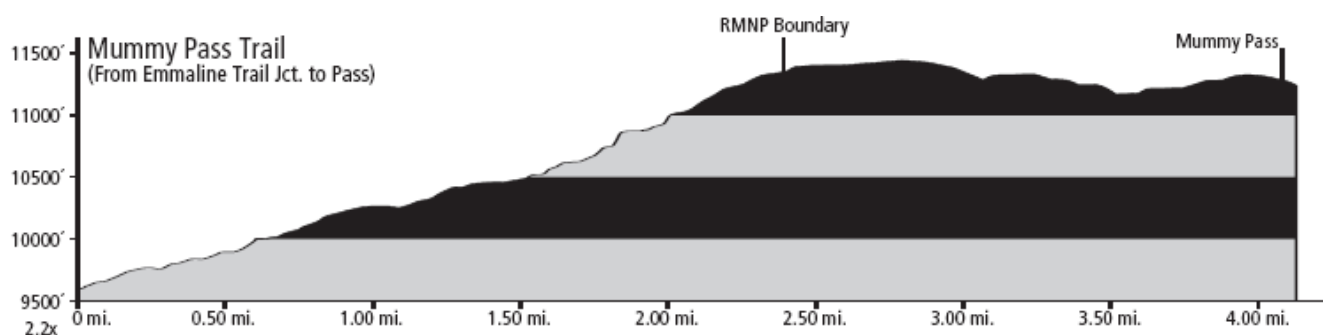
One-way Length: 5.7 miles from parking

Access: Travel 11 miles northwest of Fort Collins on U.S. Highway 287 to Colorado Highway 14. Turn left on CO 14, and travel 26 miles west to County Road 63E, Pingree Park Road. Turn left and travel 16 miles to Forest Road 145. Turn right, pass Tom Bennett Campground, and find a rough ½-mile road to the left leading to a gate at the Emmaline Lake/Mummy Pass trailhead. Parking at the beginning of the road and hiking the extra ½-mile may be preferable to driving due to the primitive condition of the road.

Trail Information: The first 2 miles are on the Emmaline Lake Trail (#945) and skirts the west side of the Pingree Park Campus of Colorado State University using a road that is bordered on both sides by private land. Please do not trespass. The Emmaline Lake Trail leads to the junction with the Mummy Pass Trail. One half mile from the junction, the Mummy Pass Trail enters the Comanche Peak Wilderness, and after 3 additional miles through forest then above timberline, it reaches the northern boundary of Rocky Mountain National Park. The trail continues in the park for 1.7 miles to Mummy Pass and also may be used for access to Mirror Lake, Comanche Peak, and other trails in the park system. Permits are required for overnight stays in Rocky Mountain National Park and no dogs are allowed.

Trail Regulations

- Dogs must be on a hand held leash

General Wilderness Regulations

- No motorized transport or mechanized equipment
- Camps, campfires, and stock, where allowed, at least 200 feet from water and trails
- Group size limited to 12 people or stock animals combined
- Certified weed-free hay is required for stock
