Backyard Burning of Garbage Illegal



The Great Basin Unified Air Pollution Control District is advising that state air quality regulations prohibit residents from burning household garbage. Burning garbage releases large amounts of dangerous chemicals into the air that remain in the environment long after the fire is extinguished.

No household garbage can be burned anywhere in the state. Dry, natural vegetation, grown on the property, can still be burned in open piles on the ground if you have a valid burn permit from your local fire protection agency and it is a permissive burn day.

Burn permits must be obtained from your local fire agency, and burning can occur only on permissive burn days. The state has designated some areas where burn barrels could be used to burn dry vegetation, paper and cardboard only.

Area Restrictions for the Burning of Vegetation, Paper and Residential Waste in Open Piles and Burn Barrels in Inyo, Mono and Alpine Counties

RESTRICTIONS FOR AREA 1:

Allowed: Burning of dry natural vegetation on piles on the ground with a valid burn permit on a permissive burn day.

Prohibited: Use of burn barrels and burning of any other residential waste.

AREA 1 includes:

City of Bishop

Town of Mammoth Lakes

RESTRICTIONS FOR AREA 2:

Allowed: Burning of dry natural vegetation on piles on the ground with a valid burn permit on a permissive burn day.

Prohibited: Use of burn barrels and burning of any other residential waste

AREA 2 includes:

93513 – Big Pine

93514* – Unincorporated area of Bishop, Laws, Round Valley, Rovana, Swall Meadows (*Excludes the City of Bishop)

93529 – June Lake & June Lake Junction

93530 – Keeler

93546** – Crowley Lake (**Excludes the Town of Mammoth Lakes)

96107 – Coleville, Walker

96133 – Topaz area

96120 – Markleeville, Emigrant Trail, Fredricksburg, Mesa Vista, Woodfords, Crystal Springs Rd, Hope Valley

RESTRICTIONS FOR AREA 3:

Allowed: Burning of non-glossy paper, cardboard and dry natural vegetation in burn barrels or on piles on the ground with a valid burn permit on a permissive burn day.

Prohibited: Burning of any other residential waste.

93514* – Chalfant, Chalfant Valley & Hammil Valley (*Excludes the City of Bishop)

OUTDOOR RESIDENTIAL WASTE BURNING INFORMATION

ALPINE COUNTY

Temporary exemption areas **might** be in the following Zip Code Tabulation Area (ZCTA), but only where there are no prior prohibitions.

- 95223

Temporary exemptions **might** be permitted in extremely low population density areas in the central portion of the County with no ZCTA assignment, but only where there are no prior prohibitions.
