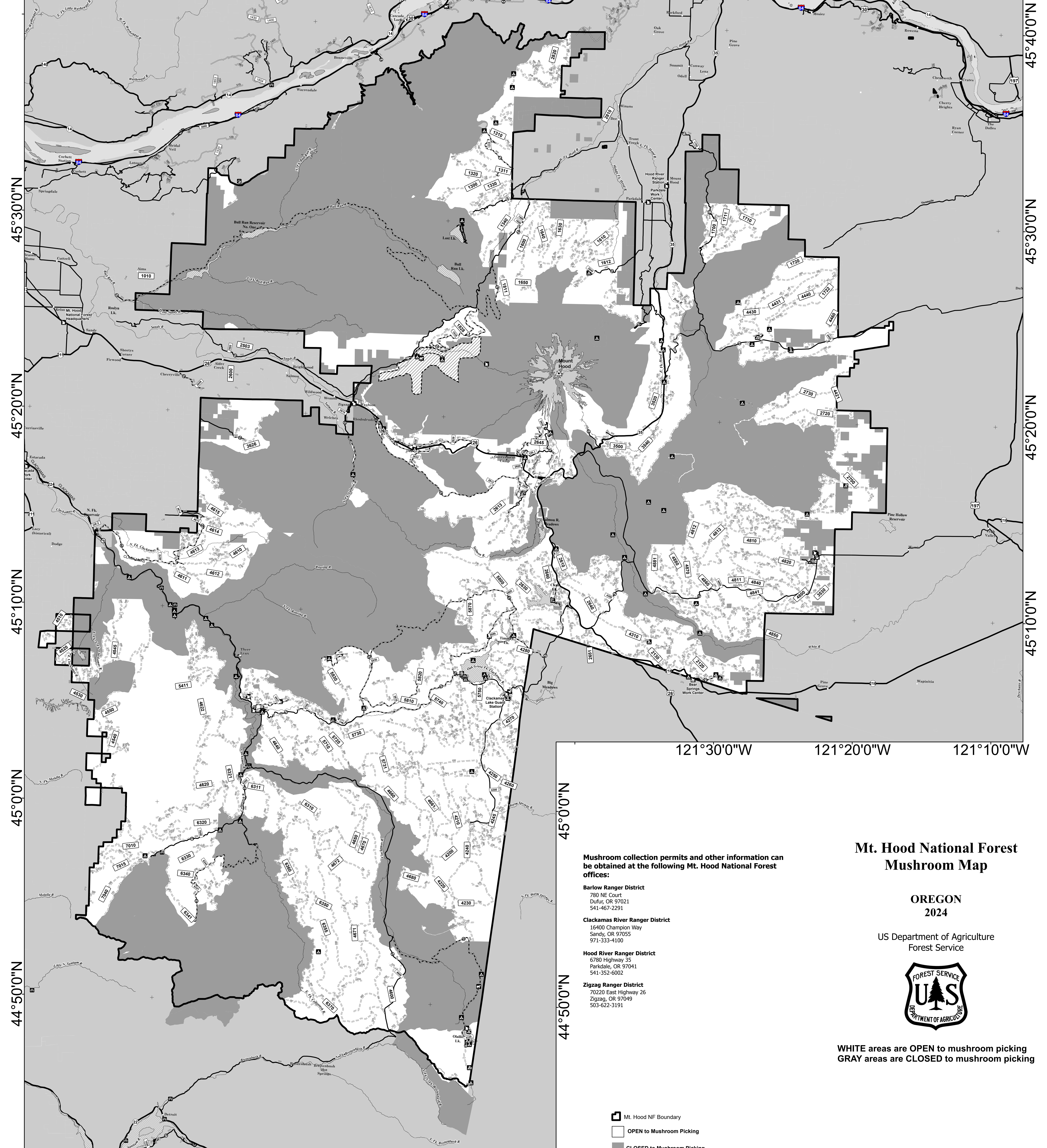

Mushroom Collection Conditions Mt. Hood National Forest

- CONDITIONS APPLICABLE TO PERSONAL USE**
- Forest products obtained under "Free Use" are for personal use only and cannot be sold or exchanged (26 CFR 201.6(f)). Commercial permit required if mushrooms will be sold.
 - "Incidental Use" allows up to 1 gallon/day per person (18 years or older), up to 10 gallons per year (1 gallon = approximately 5 pounds), for personal use only.
 - Harvest maps are free and always recommended for picking mushrooms on forest land!
- CONDITIONS APPLICABLE TO ALL**
- Permit required for quantities greater than one gallon or if intent is to sell mushrooms.
 - Commercial pickers must carry a valid permit, identification, and the Mt. Hood National Forest Mushroom Harvest Map, always while harvesting and transporting.
 - The Forest Service reserves the right to unilaterally revoke for noncompliance.
 - Mushroom harvest activities are subject to Federal statutes, regulations and State and local laws. In case of conflict, Federal regulations shall take precedence.
 - Motorized vehicles are not allowed off existing roads or on roads closed to motor vehicle use. Parking shall not block traffic nor impede fire or emergency vehicles.

- Comply with fire requirements and current restrictions to prevent forest fires.
- Engaging in mushroom picking activities is an agreement to hold the Government harmless from any claim for damage or loss of property, personal injury, or death.
- Harvest areas depicted on map as "Open to Mushroom Picking", prohibited within wilderness and campgrounds. Commercial harvest not permitted in Old Maid Flats.
- To minimize resource damage during harvest, abide by the following harvest methods:
 - Grasp the mushroom at its base and gently rock and twist until it comes loose.
 - Use a sharp knife to cut the mushroom off at ground level.
 - Insert a narrow object under the base while prying straight up to pop out.
 - Restore any disturbance resulting from picking. Rakes or shovels are not allowed.
- Harvesting activity must not damage natural features; riparian areas; other vegetation; and roads, trails, fences, ditches, or other improvements. Damage may result in fines.
- Remove all trash and litter resulting from mushroom harvesting activities.

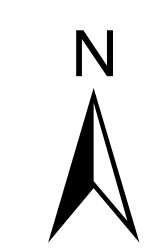
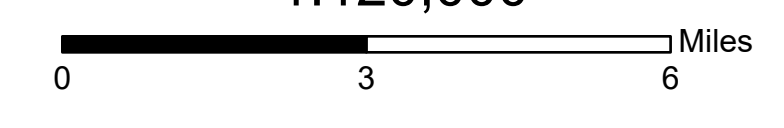
