OVERVIEW OF AGENDA: Today's purpose is to discuss and make funding recommendations on SRS - Title II proposals submitted in May 2021. Each team will have one person report out on their proposal recommendations and then we will allow for Q&A and discussion before voting on that recommendation.

1. RAC members were responsible for reviewing all proposals, ensuring intent of the legislation is met, and the interests and counties each RAC member represents. RAC sub-committees were encouraged to contact pertinent stakeholders, Project POC's and Forest/ District personnel as appropriate.
2. Votes will be based on formal recommendations. Recommendations require a majority of members from each of the 3 categories to vote in favor.
3. The DFO is the final decision maker. There is a strong history of the DFO accepting RAC recommendations. The DFO cannot fund projects that lack a RAC recommendation, but he can decide to not fund something recommended. The DFO can also decide to fund previously recommended projects.

 - b. If funds are left unspent in Linn County, RAC suggested it be moved to a road maintenance type project.

6. MARION COUNTY: Discussion on vetting process.
 - a. Discussion on projects within Marion County which cross National Forest boundary. Historically, the RAC has honored both County and Forest boundaries and kept project awards separate based on different management priorities.
 - b. Q: Concern raised regarding NHPA and SHPO concurrence on projects. The question posed in the project proposal form does not ensure that a project can legally be implemented and meet

requirements for historic preservation. D. Warnack, DFO provided assurance that all funded projects would be executed in full compliance with NEPA and NHPA. J. Sorensen, RAC Coordinator, would assess whether proposal form could be updated to address this issue.

7. MULTNOMAH COUNTY: No proposals were received for Multnomah County.

8. CLACKAMAS COUNTY: Discussion on vetting process.

- a. Mt. Hood representatives shared insight on priorities of the Mt. hood as this team did not have the opportunity to connect with project personnel or District Rangers.
 - i. Forest Roads 4220 and 5700, which serve as important ingress/egress routes, were heavily impacted by recent fires, and remain high priority for funding.
 - ii. Proposal HW1920-1010 Upper Sandy Instream Restoration is also priority.
 - iii. Discussion on the importance and role of Collaboratives in the Agency's processes. Collaboratives are limited in how they fund their work. RAC was encouraged to consider consistency in how Collaboratives are funded throughout this process, recognizing that each proposal stands on its own merit.
 - iv. Funding recommendations were unanimous and are as follows:

9. HOOD RIVER COUNTY: Discussion on vetting process.
- a. Project 1920-112 recommended to receive no funding following discussion with District Ranger who thought this project would likely receive funding through a timber sale.
 - b. Funding recommendations were unanimous and are as follows:

10. WASCO COUNTY: Discussion on vetting process.
- a. Discussion on hazard tree mitigation along NFS Roads. Forest Leadership offered context: Once roads are impacted by fire they generally remain closed for safety/liability purposes until hazards can be mitigated. Typically within the first-year post fire, NEPA is completed then contracts are awarded/administered to remove hazard trees. The wood is only viable for about one-year post fire event, otherwise the work will not pay for itself. Post one year, the USFS then transitions to service contracts to remove such hazards. Currently on the Mt. Hood there is roughly \$200-\$300 million dollars' worth of work in addressing Haz-Mat needs, hazard trees, building removal and re-building efforts.
 - b. Q: FEMA was able to help in removing hazard trees, turning that work over to ODOT. Can the USFS work with ODOT to assist in the removal of hazard trees along NFS Roadways? A: No, FEMA will not issue funding to federal entities. They issue funding/assistance to state and private land holders.
 - c. Project 1920-115 recommended to receive no funding following discussion with District Ranger who thought this project would likely receive funding through other sources.

11. Resolution of unallocated funds:

- a. Discussion on how to ensure Multnomah County benefits from the use of allocated funds despite a lack of submitted projects in their County. RAC voted unanimously to apply Multnomah County funds (\$26,474.38) to MHNF "Upper Sandy Salmon and Steelhead Instream Restoration Project", No. HW1920-101, located upstream of Multnomah County and thereby benefiting the appropriate county. RAC coordinator will contact FS Regional Office to ensure shifting these funds is allowable. RAC members, specifically W. Tucker, will reach out to Multnomah County Commissioners to inform them of this intention/rationale.
- b. Discussion of proper allocation of Jefferson County and Deschutes County funds to best benefit those counties. RAC voted unanimously to reallocate Jefferson County (\$2,123.75) and Deschutes County (\$68.48) funds to neighboring RACs who better represent these Counties' interests.

12. Residual Funds Recommendations

- a. RAC voted unanimously to allocate or reallocate any new or unused funds from FY19/20 to deferred road and trail maintenance projects.

NEXT STEPS:

1. RAC Coordinator will prepare the recommendation packages for DFO consideration and approval.
2. Upon DFO approval, RAC Coordinator will notify project proponents of funding awards and initiate funds allocation/spending.
3. RAC Coordinator will work to coordinate a field site visit to some previously awarded Title II projects.
