



## CAMPGROUNDS AND DAY-USE AREAS

- Camping is permitted only in designated campsites.
- All campsites have fire rings and grills. Fires are permitted only in grills or designated fire rings.
- Campgrounds do not have RV hookups or sanitary dump stations.
- Quiet hours are 10 p.m. – 6 a.m.
- At least one person must occupy a campsite during the first night after camping equipment is set up.
- Drinking water is available at all campgrounds.
- Cleaning or washing of fish, animals, or food is not allowed at campground hydrants or restroom sinks.
- Camping fees include the use of day-use sites within the Prescott National Forest. See pay station for details.
- Day-use hours vary by season and are approximately dawn to dusk. See posted hours at each site.
- Dumping refuse from private property is not allowed.
- Keep wildlife wild. Maintain a clean campsite to reduce nuisance animals and pests.

## TARGET SHOOTING AND HUNTING

Discharging any weapon within 150 yards of a recreation site or occupied area is prohibited.

- Your camping fee covers:
  - 1 vehicle for single-family campsite.
  - 2 vehicles for double campsite.
- \$5 for second vehicle at a single campsite.
- \$5 each for 3rd and 4th vehicles at a double site.
- Maximum vehicles: 2/single site, 4/double site.

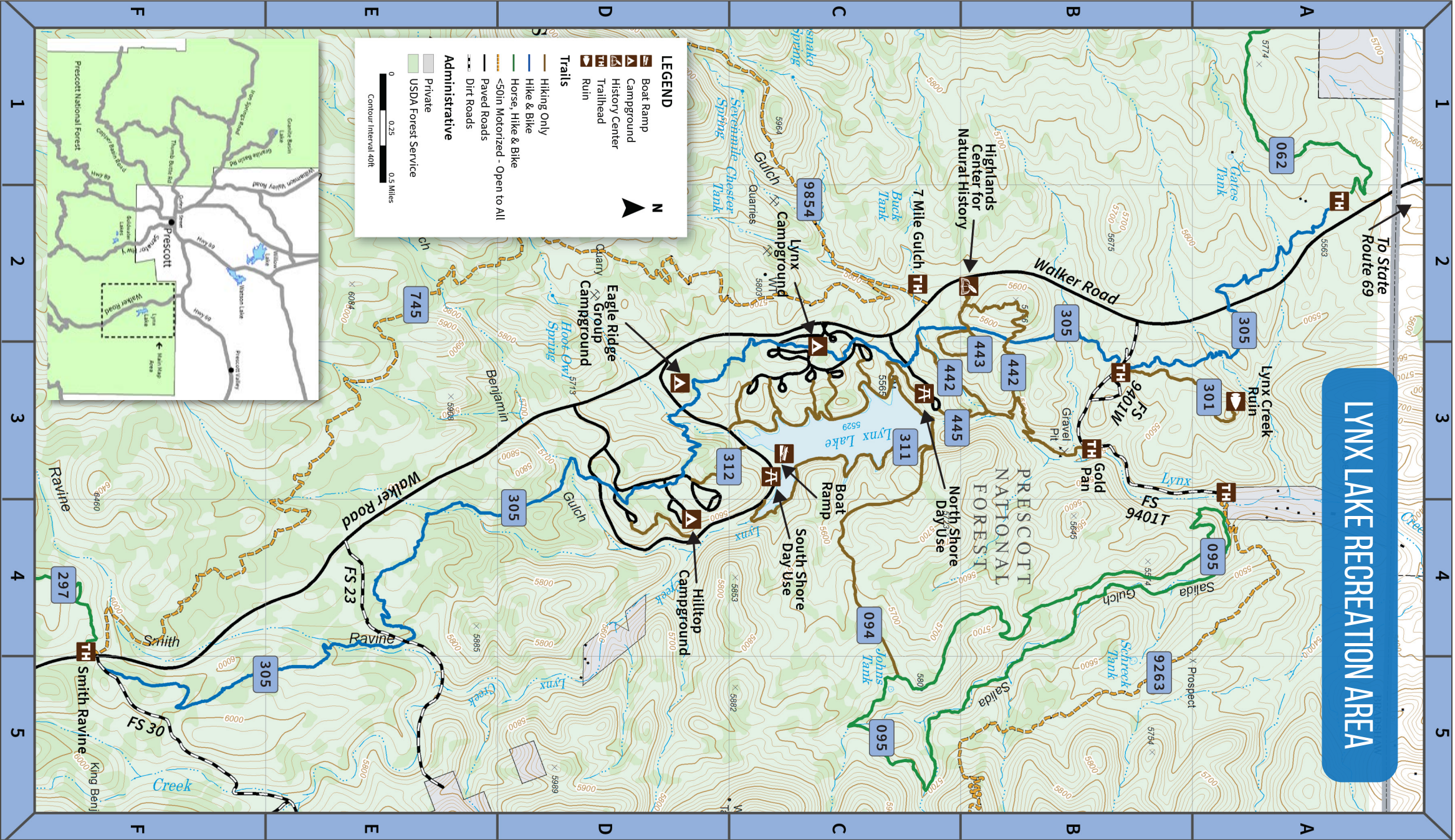

<p>Trail etiquette is an important part of keeping trails safe and fun for everyone. Please remember to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Respect other users.</li><li>• Be friendly and courteous.</li><li>• Bicyclists yield to horses and hikers.</li><li>• Hikers yield to horses. Stop to allow horses to pass safely.</li><li>• Downhill traffic yields to uphill. When in doubt, yield.</li><li>• Warn people when you are planning to pass.</li><li>• Using trails with headphones is dangerous; avoid their use.</li><li>• Bicyclists: Anticipate other users around corners and control your speed.</li><li>• E-bikes are only allowed on designated trails.</li></ul>	<p>The east side of Trail 311 and portions of Trail 94 are closed each year from December 1 to June 30 to allow for the nesting of bald eagles. The bald eagle is a threatened species and requires no human disturbance to produce viable offspring. This closure includes portions of the trail on the dam.</p>	<p>Located at North Shore day-use area, the store is open from late spring to early fall. Restaurant hours vary by season. For more information, call 928-778-0720. The store operates under a special use permit from the Prescott National Forest.</p>	<p>This non-profit organization has a learning center and trail system along Walker Road. The center offers outdoor science education for visitors of all ages, focusing on the unique ecology of the Central Arizona Highlands. For more information, call 928-776-9550. The center operates under a special use permit from the Prescott National Forest.</p>	<p><b>NEED A FEW GOOD REASONS TO LEASH YOUR DOG?</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Leashes protect dogs from becoming lost and from wildland hazards, such as porcupines, mountain lions, snakes, and sick, injured, or rabid animals.</li><li>• Unleashed dogs harass, injure, and sometimes kill wildlife.</li><li>• Unleashed dogs intimidate other hikers and their dogs, depriving them of the peace wildlands provide.</li><li>• Failure to leash your dog could result in a fine.</li></ul>	<p>Great views of Lynx Creek and Lynx Lake. Connects to Trail 9854 and Watershed Trail. Remember safety in sharing the trail: bikes yield to hikers and horses. A small part of this trail is part of the Prescott Circle Trail.</p> <p>An enjoyable loop trail. The trail showcases everything from prickly pear cactus to ponderosa pine and riparian willows.</p> <p>Short interpretive trail through pinon and juniper to an observation platform at a prehistoric ruin. Fee is \$5.</p> <p>Beware at road crossings! This trail connects to several sites and other trails. Bikes yield to hikers.</p> <p>A popular hiking trail that goes around Lynx Lake. The west side is paved and accessible to wheelchairs. Fee is \$5. Equestrian use prohibited. Most of the trail is easy; the last road crossing heading south climbs steeply.</p> <p>Remember safety in sharing the trail: bikes yield to hikers and horses. ATVs and motorcycles ride responsibly and stay on trails, tread lightly, and watch out for others.</p> <p>Connects Walker Road (CO 57) to Watershed Trail and to Senator Highway (CO 56).
