



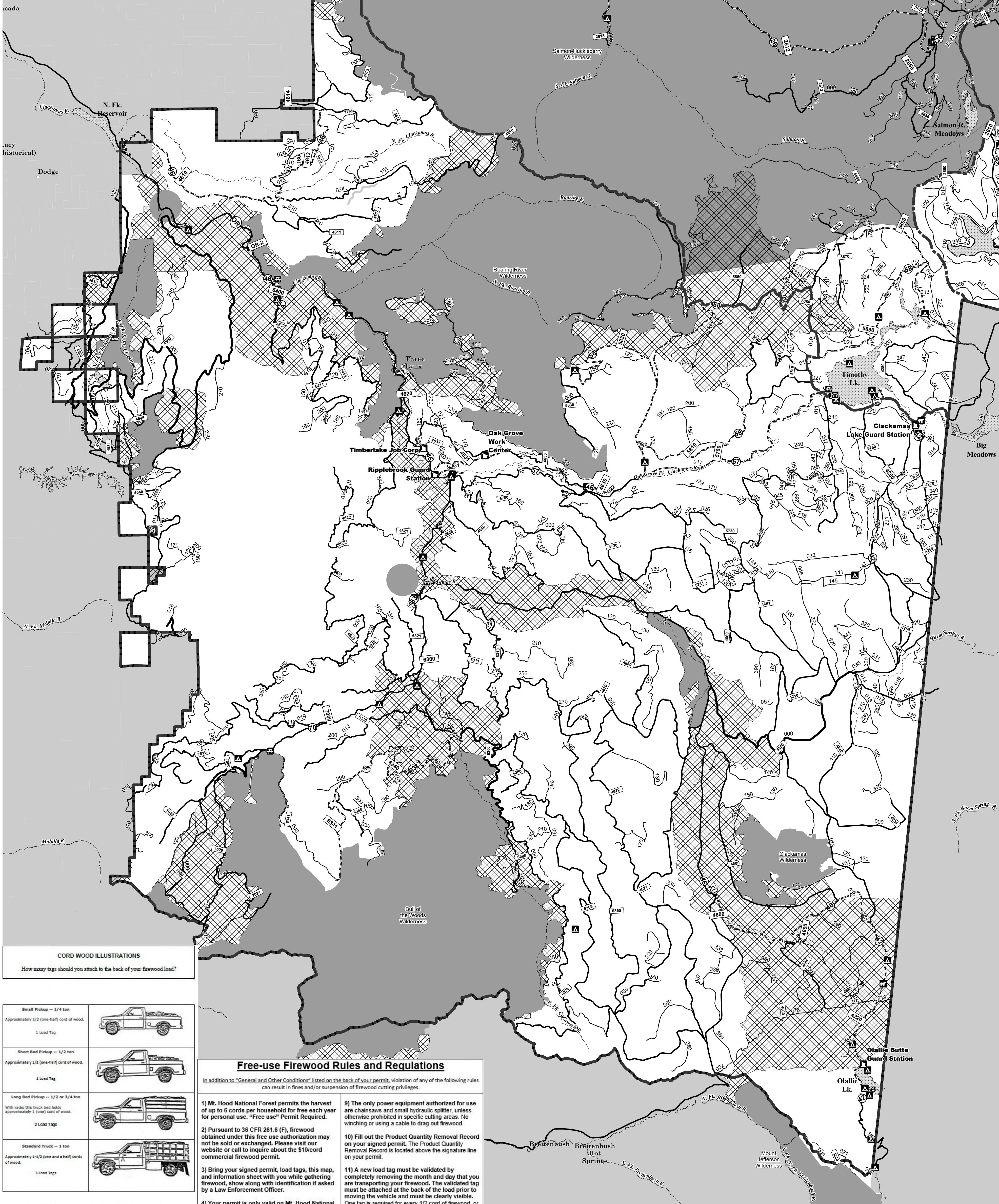

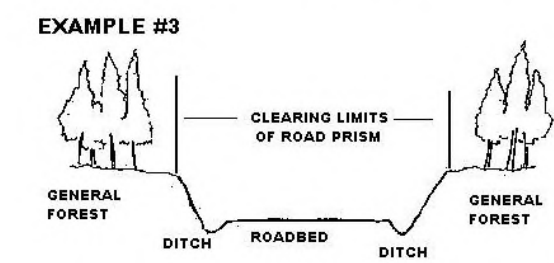
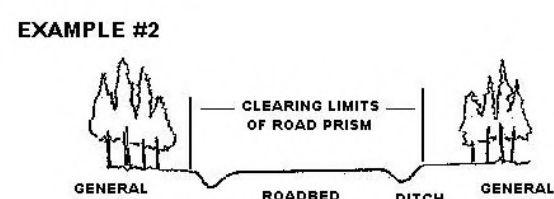
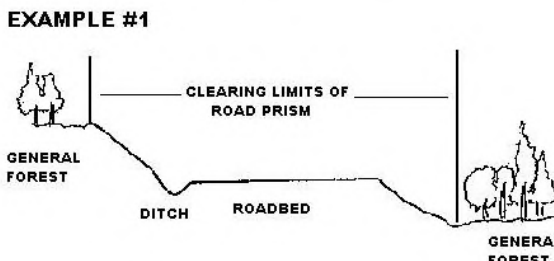


CORD WOOD ILLUSTRATIONS

How many tags should you attach to the back of your firewood load?

Small Pickup -- 1/4 ton Approximately 1/2 (one-half) cord of wood. 1 Load Tag	
Short Bed Pickup -- 1/2 ton Approximately 1/2 (one-half) cord of wood. 1 Load Tag	
Long Bed Pickup -- 1/2 or 3/4 ton With racks this truck bed holds approximately 1 (one) cord of wood. 2 Load Tags	
Standard Truck -- 1 ton Approximately 1-1/2 (one and a half) cords of wood. 3 Load Tags	

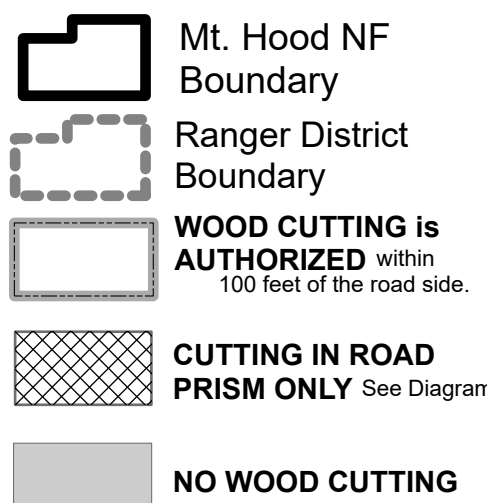
DIAGRAMS DEFINING THE ROAD PRISM



Free-use Firewood Rules and Regulations

In addition to "General and Other Conditions" listed on the back of your permit, violation of any of the following rules can result in fines and/or suspension of firewood cutting privileges.

- 1) Mt. Hood National Forest permits the harvest of up to 6 cords per household for free each year for personal use. "Free use" Permit Required.
- 2) Pursuant to 36 CFR 261.6 (F), firewood obtained under this free use authorization may not be sold or exchanged. Please visit our website or call to inquire about the \$10/cord commercial firewood permit.
- 3) Bring your signed permit, load tags, this map, and information sheet with you while gathering firewood, show along with identification if asked by a Law Enforcement Officer.
- 4) Your permit is only valid on Mt. Hood National Forest land. If you are unsure about where you are, do not cut and please call or submit a Special Forest Product Request.
- 5) Woodcutting is only permitted within road prisms and/or within 100 feet of roads open to motor vehicle use as illustrated on this map. Permits not valid in areas closed to motor vehicles. Check before selecting your wood-cutting area.
- 6) WOODCUTTING IS PROHIBITED in developed campgrounds, Wilderness Areas, Late Successional Reserves, Research Natural Areas, riparian areas (riparian areas are defined as land within 300 feet of water such as springs, streams, wet meadows, floodplains and overflow channels). Timber sale areas (for example, where standing trees and/or downed logs are painted, boundary flagging is present, logging equipment and log decks or where stumps are present and it appears trees have been cut down.), and all other areas posted closed to woodcutting unless otherwise indicated on the Cutting Information Sheet.
- 7) Off road travel is not authorized while collecting firewood. Park on the shoulder or in a safe constructed wide spot to gather firewood.
- 8) Do not cut trees (standing and/or down) marked with paint, signs, and/or wildlife tags.
- 9) The only power equipment authorized for use are chainsaws and small hydraulic splitter, unless otherwise prohibited in specific cutting areas. No winching or using a cable to drag out firewood.
- 10) Fill out the Product Quantity Removal Record on your signed permit. The Product Quantity Removal Record is located above the signature line on your permit.
- 11) A new load tag must be validated by completely removing the month and day that you are transporting your firewood. The validated tag must be attached at the back of the load prior to moving the vehicle and must be clearly visible. One tag is required for every 1/2 cord of firewood, or any portion thereof. See Cord Wood Illustrations.
- 12) Remove any woodcutting debris or slash from roads and ditches. Pack out ALL garbage.
- 13) Woodcutting is not allowed on Highways. Forest Service Roads 42, 45, 46, 54, 58, 63 and 70 are not open to roadside cutting unless otherwise indicated. Cutting blowdown and removing from within the road prism is allowed.



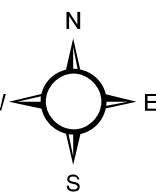
