

Roads Open to All Ve

These roads are open to all motor vehicles, including smaller off-highway vehicles that may not be licensed for highway use (but not to oversize or overweight vehicles under State traffic law).

Other Public Roads

These symbols are used to show routes the Forest Service does not have jurisdiction over and has not designated for motorized use. These symbols are part of the reference layers showing connections to towns and cities outside the forest boundary.

Motorized Dispersed Camping:

This symbol is used along with a designated road or trail to indicate limited cross-country motor vehicle use within 100 feet of that route, solely for the purpose of motorized dispersed camping. Motorized dispersed camping is allowed only for ingress and egress following the most direct route from and to a designated NFS road and for parking a recreational vehicle. The dots indicate where this activity is permitted. They may be on the left, right, or both sides of all or portions the route. Refer to the Dispersed Camping Table for specifics.

Not Open to Game Retrieval

This symbol indicates places with where motorized game retrieval is not authorized to protect resources and maintain desired conditions.

Short Route Identifier:

70333

This symbol is used for roads that are too short to show a symbol type on the map. The symbol contains the number of the road or trail. Users should refer to the corresponding number in the Short Route Table for designation information.

The Forest Service manages e-bikes as a motor vehicle. Class 1, 2, and 3 e-bikes are allowed on roads designated for all classes of motor vehicles and roads designated for motorized mixed use.

Game Retrieval: Elk Only The limited use of a motor v

The limited use of a motor vehicle is allowed off of the designated road system to retrieve a legally hunted and tagged elk during elk hunting seasons as designated by the Arizona Game and Fish Department, and for 24 hours following the end of each season.

When a big game animal has been legally taken, the individual who legally took the animal may drive or be driven to the downed animal. Under no circumstance may a second vehicle be used to retrieve the animal. The vehicle should be of sufficient capacity that only one trip is necessary. The vehicle may only be driven one mile from a designated open road.

Hunters are required to use the most direct and least ground disturbing route in and out of the area to accomplish the retrieval. Motorized game retrieval is not permitted in travel restricted areas, and may not cross riparian areas, streams or wetland areas except at hardened crossings or crossings with existing culverts. Motorized game retrieval is not permitted more than one mile from an open road or when conditions are such that travel would increase the likelihood of negative resource impacts (i.e. muddy, wet soils with potential for compaction and rutting).
