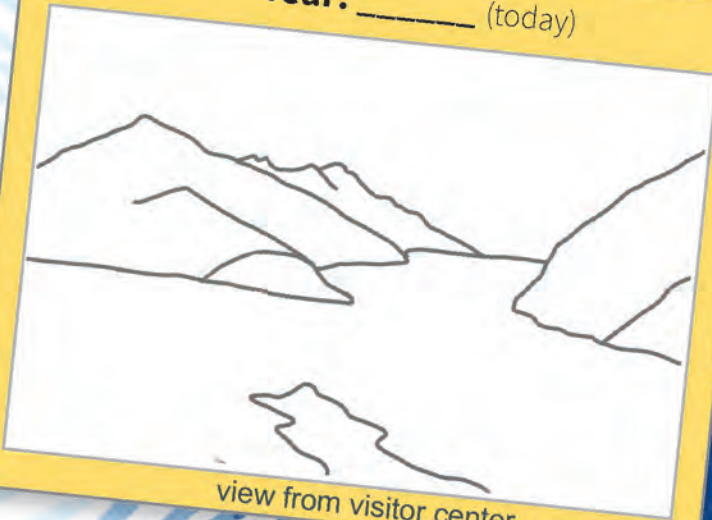
A Changing Glacier

Tlingit, Haida, and Tsimshian people call the Tongass home. This is a Tlingit boat (yaakw) made from western redcedar.



Tlingit people are born into their identity. All Tlingit clans are organized into two major moieties, or groups – Eagle and Raven. Chaak is Eagle and Yéil is Raven.



Admiralty Island is the highest home to density of brown bears (xóots) in North America.

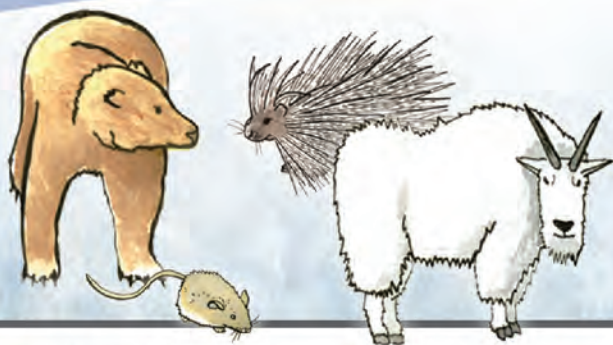
Voices of the Land)))

What's In The Trees

What could be happening right over your head?

Birds aren't the only creatures we see in trees. Pretend to be some of the critters that spend time high above the ground. Be safe and stay on the ground while doing these activities.

Red Squirrel Jump

Red squirrels look for nuts and berries in trees. Look and listen for squirrels jumping tree to tree.

☐ Try a standing long-jump and see how far you can go.



Black Bear Race

Mother bears teach their cubs to climb trees to escape danger.

☐ See how fast you can "walk like a bear" in 10 seconds.



Porcupine Balance

Porcupines spend time in trees because they eat the leaves. They use their tail to keep their balance.

☐ Walk in a straight line, placing one foot directly in front of the other for 15 steps.



Plant Scavenger Hunt

As a glacier melts, bare rock is exposed. Plants begin to take over the rocky land in a special order. From the smallest forms of plant life to the tallest trees, each takes its turn in this process. This is called plant succession. Can you find a plant from each stage?

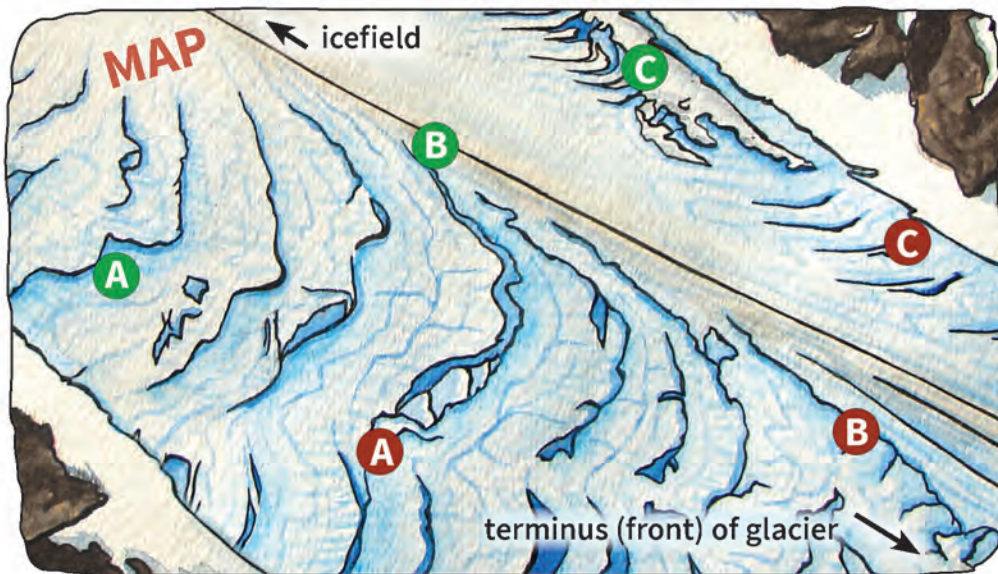

Glacier Science

Every summer a group of students, professors and scientists do research on the ice. The group is called JIRP (Juneau Icefield Research Program). JIRP participants do several measurements to understand if the glacier and icefield have gained or lost mass in a year. For this activity, imagine you are a JIRP researcher. In the spring you place several large metal poles into the ice and record the locations. When you return in the fall you measure how far the ice has moved. Use the map and key to answer the questions below.

How does this research help?

Favorite Foods: Mostly seeds, sometimes insects.

Style: Black head, brown back, white outer tail feathers.

Where to Find: On or near the ground looking for seeds.

Fun Fact: Juncos spend their winters together in flocks. They can also be seen foraging with other birds, like chickadees and nuthatches.

Arctic Tern
Sterna paradisaea

Favorite Foods: Small fish, crustaceans, and insects.

Style: White with black cap and bright orange beak.

Where to Find: Flying across the lake & diving to catch fish.

Fun Fact: Arctic Terns travel up to 25,000 miles from its Arctic breeding grounds to its wintering grounds off of Antarctica!



The Icon
Bald Eagle
Haliaeetus leucocephalus

Favorite Foods: Mostly fish, also birds and small mammals.

Style: Brown with yellow beak, white head and tail.

Where to Find: On an iceberg, near the water's edge, or in a tree.

Fun Fact: Immature (young) eagles are dark brown. A bald eagle doesn't have bright white head feathers until it is about five years old.
