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Abstract

This **2006 Final Environmental Impact Statement** for the Wayne National Forest 2006 Revised Land and Resource Management Plan (2006 Revised Forest Plan) was prepared according to Department of Agriculture 1982 forest planning regulations (36 CFR 219) which are based on the Forest and Rangeland Renewable Resources Planning Act (RPA), as amended by the National Forest Management Act of 1976 (NFMA). This plan was also developed in accordance with regulations (40 CFR 1500) for implementing the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA).

A companion document to the Final Environmental Impact Statement, the **2006 Land and Resource Management Plan (2006 Forest Plan)** has been prepared as required by NEPA and 36 CFR 219 and is available from the Wayne National Forest.

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
