Authorities

- EO 13175 On November 6, 2000, President Clinton signed Executive Order 13175 Consultation and Coordination With Indian Tribal Governments in order to establish regular and meaningful consultation and collaboration with tribal officials in the development of Federal Indian policies that have tribal implications.
- PL 102-575 The National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 requires federal agencies to consult with Indian Tribes throughout the compliance process associated with section 106. Section 301 (4) of the act, includes ANCSA corporations in the definition of Indian Tribes.
- PL 101-601 Numerous provisions of the Native American Graves and Protection Act direct federal agencies to consult with Indian Tribes in implementing this act. The regulations for this act (43 CFR10.29) include ANCSA corporations in the definition of Indian Tribes.
- PL 108-477 Section 518 of the 2005 Consolidated Appropriations Act amends section 161 of PL 108-199 (the 2004 Consolidated Appropriations Act) to include all federal agencies in the requirement to "hereafter consult with Alaska Native corporations on the same basis as Indian tribes under Executive Order No. 13175."
- PL 91-190 The National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) of 1969 is our basic national charter for protection of the environment. The implementing regulations (40 CFR 1500-1508) include numerous requirements for consultation, including 40 CFR 1501.2 (d)(2) that requires early consultation with Indian Tribes.
- PL 96-487 Title VIII of the Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act of 1980 concerns subsistence management and the use of fish and wildlife. Federal agencies communicate with tribes in establishing priorities for subsistence hunting and fishing, in developing policies that ensure the continuance of subsistence uses, and in determining whether proposed land management actions will significantly restrict subsistence uses.
