IDAHO PANHANDLE RESOURCE ADVISORY COMMITTEE SUMMARY OF MEETING

September 15, 2023

The Idaho Panhandle Resource Advisory Committee was convened for its second meeting at 9:00 A.M. on September 15, 2023, at the Interagency Natural Resource Center in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. Acting Forest Supervisor Heather DeGeest, Designated Federal Official, represented the Forest Service and Julie Kallemeyn, co-chair, served as chairperson in Chuck Roady's absence.

In accordance with the provisions of Public Law 92-463, the meeting was open to the public from 9:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M.

REVIEW OF PREVIOUS MEETING

The RAC reviewed the previous month's meeting and discussed any follow questions. One member asked how Title II funds differ from appropriated funds and how this funding is used differently from regular program of work. Heather DeGeest responded that the national forest has a lot of funding sources, but there are some projects that the national forest has difficulty funding through the regular sources. Recreation, invasive weeds removal, and road maintenance are some of the highest priority work that does not receive enough funding through appropriations and needs supplemental funds from the RAC and other grants.

PROJECT PRESENTATIONS

RAC members then heard presentations on the remaining seven project proposals. The RAC heard presentations on 26 proposals at the previous month's meeting for a total of 33 proposals. Each proponent was allotted 3 minutes for a presentation and then RAC members had up to 10 minutes to ask questions of the project proponents. The RAC members had previously received all project application materials and had two weeks to read and review the materials prior to hearing the presentations.

Heather DeGeest and Jessica Stutzke representing Shoshone County also discussed a proposal to provide an additional \$100,000 to Shoshone County from previous year funds to correct a previous year's oversight. DeGeest and Stutzke explained that a previous RAC had recommended \$100,000 to Shoshone County for road work, but the funds were never spent. Through an oversight, the county spent \$100,000 of its own funds to mitigate a failing tunnel at Moon Pass that was blocking traffic at a major transportation corridor on National Forest System lands. Since the Title II funds had not yet been obligated when the work was done, the funds could not be used for their intended purpose. DeGeest and Stutzke proposed the RAC recommend an additional \$100,000 to Shoshone County this year to compensate for past work, and that additional money would not detract from the current funding available.

PROJECT AND FUNDING SELECTION

The RAC spent the rest of the meeting reviewing their individual rankings of project proposals and working to add a funding number to the highest priority proposals. This was accomplished using an Excel spreadsheet broadcast on the screen and online for virtual participants. RAC members worked their way through the priority list and decided on funding figures until the allotted entirety of funding (\$1.525 million) was exhausted. The group captured some notes in the margins instructing where they believe funding should be spent if more funding or previous year funding should become available. The group also unanimously agreed to recommend an additional \$100,000 of 2018 funds for Shoshone County based on circumstances related by the Forest Service and the County. The recommendations are captured in the table below.
